

Please see below some more examples of mitigating the potential for opportunity crime

Problem	Mitigation	Explained
		<p>Improved lighting to reduce darkened areas can help remove the opportunity of an offender being hidden and reduce fear of crime.</p>
		<p>Street infrastructure can form a step to easily access tall hoardings. Incorporating a hood over a cabinet can help reduce climbing opportunities.</p>
		<p>Hoods can also assist with reducing the littering opportunity (removal of flat surface) and also helps remove litter which can be used as a weapon e.g. glass bottles.</p>
		<p>This site removed the posts a sign was attached to as it could be used as a step to assist with climbing into site. The sign was then fixed (flush) to the hoarding.</p>

		<p>Enclosed gantries can cause claustrophobic environments and can reduce natural surveillance from outside. Open, airy and easy to see in and out gantries are preferred.</p>
		<p>Windows within hoardings can reduce curiosity and also be an aid to see who is in the site area.</p>
		<p>Removing recesses and corners by smoothing off hoardings can remove hiding spots.</p>
		<p>If corners cannot be removed, trixi mirrors can help assist with seeing who is around the corner</p>
<p>Summary</p> <p>The examples are not prescriptive. However, they can assist with removing the opportunity for crime.</p> <p>We advise developers and their contractors to carefully consider the site layout design in advance of installation.</p>
